Interschools 2024

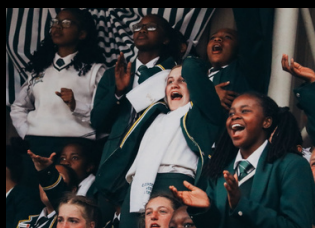

Old Unionite plays for SA Deaf Rugby

The SA Deaf Rugby series was held recently at St Stithians College in Randburg, Gauteng where Old Unionite Laszlo Maya, who held the position of Head Boy at Union in 2012, played for South Africa.

The South African Deaf Rugby Association (SADRA) made history by hosting its first-ever international deaf rugby series.

The tournament featured rugby teams representing Australia, England and Japan. The South African team consisted of players from all over the country who were chosen after SADRA conducted trials which enabled the best players to showcase their skills. The competition had a hearing classification of a 40dB loss in order for players to be eligible.

The Deaf Rugby tournament hosted a 7s and 10s rugby match as part of its August Internationals. The 7's ran from 3 to 4 August and the 10's from 7 to 8 August.

Maya played in the 10s tournament, between South Africa, Australia and England. The trials to represent the SA Deaf rugby team were held in Gauteng, Eastern Cape and Western Cape during the first half of the year. Maya travelled to Strand to take part in the Western Cape trials in May this year, and subsequently made the SA team. It was one of his greatest experiences and he thoroughly enjoyed it.

"Representing your country is always special. I've always played with and against normal-hearing players, so to be surrounded by players with whom

I share a life experience, was something I really looked forward to," says Maya.

"I was curious as to how we will communicate on-field and execute our plays. People with hearing loss do not all fall under one category. There are different degrees of hearing loss, coupled with the different means of communication. So we needed to find common ground. Sign language was the best way to communicate plays and get everyone on the same page.

Those who do not know sign language were taught the simple signs prior to matches," he says. Maya played two matches on Wednesday 7 August, and another two on the Thursday. Maya scored tries on both days.

In Memoriam

Old Unionite William Smith, the mathematics teacher that many South Africans grew up with, passed away recently after a long battle with cancer at his home in Perth, Australia, surrounded by family. He was 85 years-old.

Smith matriculated from Union High School in 1956.

Over the years, Smith reached many young people in South Africa and beyond, for whom his televised lessons were the only quality instruction they received in Mathematics and Science.

Thanks to his exceptional teaching skills and compassion, for almost two decades, the Learning Channel became an indispensable platform for young people of our country to receive interactive TV education in Mathematics and Science. In this way, he became the teacher for the entire South African nation.

After matriculating, Smith completed his BSc and his BSc (Hons), both with distinction, at Rhodes University. His parents JLB Smith, who identified the coelacanth, and Margaret Smith, ichthyologist and accomplished fish illustrator, both had deep-rooted ties with the University and Makhanda (then Grahamstown). In 1962, Mr Smith completed his MSc in seven months at the University of Natal. Although his initial journey was into the world of business, working at African Explosives and Chemical Industries and Afrox, he soon realised he would not be content unless he followed his passion for teaching.



In 1990, Smith began producing The Learning Channel's educational television programmes with the financial backing of Hylton Appelbaum, then Executive Director of the Liberty Life Foundation.

Besides his education programmes, Smith appeared along with Jeremy Mansfield in the popular South African television quiz show, *A Word or 2*. He was also a judge for the Miss South Africa Pageant in 1998 and 1999.

Mr Smith was voted 86th in the Top 100 Great South Africans in 2004. In 2019, he was awarded the Order of the Baobab (silver) in recognition of his services to teaching and the "demystification of mathematics and science". The National Orders are the highest awards that South Africans can receive. The president bestows a national order upon a South African citizen or member of the international community who has contributed towards making South Africa a democratic and prosperous country.

Smith is also a renowned conservationist and owned the Featherbed Nature Reserve in Knysna, where he lived until the sale of the land and company in 2004.
